A message from the Club Captain

Men's A Pennant team's run to the finals

The Men's A pennant team's run to the finals started with a hiccup when they were beaten 5½-3½ by Feilding at Hawkestone on April 28th. Trailing Feilding 2-1 in the morning foursomes, they had to win four singles. However, only Reid Perry and Greg Shaw won, while No 6 Matt Francis halved. At the top, Feilding No 1 Liam Finlayson beat Regan McConaghty 2 up, veteran Tony Chettleburgh, who doubles as a Manawatu member, beat Ewan Westergaard 1 up, and James Humphrey beat Manawatu's Josh Sedgwick 4 and 2. After this round Manawatu, Palmerston North and Feilding were all tied on 15 points before the last qualifying round in Levin on May 12.

At the final round robin at Levin the A's bounced back from the loss to Feilding to beat Palmerston North $5\frac{1}{2}$ - $3\frac{1}{2}$. We were 2 -1 up after the foursomes then wins by Craig Nash 3 and 2, Reid Perry 4 and 3 and Greg Shaw 1 up and a half by Regan McConaghty over Junior Tatana in the afternoon singles sealed the win. This left us tied with Feilding on 18 points after the round robins but our superior games margin, $48\frac{1}{2}$ to 43 meant we hosted the final the following weekend.

At the final on Sunday May 19th we were down 2 to 1 after the morning foursomes. Craig Nash & Matt Francis lost 3 and 1 while Ewan Westergaard and Reid Perry had a half as did Regan McConaghty and Greg Shaw.

In the afternoon the matches between the 5s & 6s, Craig Nash won 3 and 1 against Trevor Ward while Matt Francis halved with one of our greenskeepers, Damian Walker. The number 1s and 2s fought solid matches with both Ewan and Regan winning 3 and 2 on the 16th against Tony Chettleburgh and Liam Finlayson respectively. Ewan playing some of his best golf over the closing 9 holes.

This left the 3s and 4s playing two very tight matches with Reid Perry battling against Mike Atkins and Greg Shaw against James Humphrey. For the second week in a row Greg Shaw found himself three down with six to play but battled back with wins on 13 and 15. Playing the 17th with the gathering crowd following the top groups finishing on the 16th, Reid was square and Greg 1 down. Having to take a free drop from the garden behind the 17th Reid played the perfect bump-and-run to smack the middle of the flag and hole the shot for birdie to go one up. A minute later the spectators were cheering again as Greg Shaw holed a long birdie putt to go back to square. Greg finished the 18th square while a birdie to Reid saw him win 2 up. Final result Manawatu 6, Feilding 3 and the 2019 pennant was ours! This is our 12th title in 15 years!

It was great to see so many supporters for both sides especially for the afternoon singles. Well done to Ewan & Nashy who have built a superb team spirit amongst the squad.

Club Captain's Report



COURSE REPORT

May has flown by and we start the month of June with a cold snap. We have had warmer weather so far. Course is looking good going into winter with great cover of turf. Autumn has come along with strong winds, which has put leaves over the course, as it does each year.

Greens have been fertilised as well as top dressed. Greens have a good cover and are rolling consistent. With the traffic and the moisture around they tend to get a little bobble, overall all good.

Tees have been dethatched, top dressed and fertiliser applied. They are due for a solid fertiliser. Good result despite the rain. Surrounds have been fertilised, they are due to be cored and tumble cored in June.

Fairways are looking great. We have just applied solid fertiliser to help with growth and cover in the winter. Few weeds out there, will look to treat over the winter.

12th hole re-alignment is coming along great, it is starting to take shape now. Drainage holes around the place are working so far. There are few more areas we have on our to-do list.

With the WET season upon us, can I please remind you to be aware of where you are driving your GOLF CART. Do not try and go up the stop bank, drive on tees, and stay well away from greens.

Please continue to repair your pitchmarks and replace your divots. We appreciate the effort.

On a good note, enjoy your coming month of golf, play well and achieve any goals you may have. Good luck to anyone playing club competitions.

No Golf humour this Month. A lot of people ask about why they cant go out and play when it's a frost, so here are the reasons:

Frost causes the dew on the outside of the leaf and the moisture within the leaf to freeze.

In colder parts of NZ the crown and soil surface will also freeze.

If this is left to melt naturally the damage to the turf is negligible.

However when you walk on frosted grass, namely:

- A surface frost (as shown) will 1 2 days later turn black and many of the leaves walked on will die. The result is a slight thinning of the turf. Now consider the number of golfers walking over the grass and worst yet several days of frost and the turf can thin considerably.
 To make this worst, limited (if any) recovery will occur during winter and the thin turf cover can last until spring.
- Frozen crowns/soil surface causes more severe thinning of the turf cover as you will crush and kill the grass plant (crown) and can cause the roots to be sheared from the plant.

Safety – we have a responsibility to provide a safe environment in which you can enjoy your golf.

Walking/driving on frozen turf (particularly given most clubs now adopt spikeless footwear) increases the risk of crashes, slips and injury.

Rules Corner

Several members have just completed a course on the Rules of Golf and some sat the associated R&A Level 1 or Level 2 exams. I am delighted with the overall understanding of the new rules these members displayed in their exam results. While some members participated in this course with the aim of progressing on to become qualified golf referees, many did so to improve their understanding of the new rules and to assist them in applying the rules correctly during club and competition play.

The participating members were provided with preparation material appropriate for the Level (1 or 2) that they were intending to be examined on. Among this material were several sets of test questions and mock final exams to assist with their preparation for the actual test to be taken.

For the general membership, here is a sample set of these test questions (combination of Level 1 and 2 tests) to see how well you understand the new Rules of Golf.

- 1. A player's ball comes to rest against a rake which is outside the bunker. The player moves the rake and the player's ball moves as a result. Which of the following is true:
- a) The player gets a 1 stroke penalty for causing the ball to move and the ball must be replaced
- b) There is no penalty and the ball must be replaced
- c) There is no penalty and the player must drop the ball as near as possible to where it lay, not nearer the hole
- 2. When playing a hole, the general area includes all of the course except the following:
- a) All teeing areas, all penalty areas, all bunkers, and the putting green of the hole being played
- b) All penalty areas, all bunkers, the teeing area and putting green of the hole being played
- c) The teeing area, all penalty areas, all bunkers and all greens
- 3. A player plays her ball onto the 10th green on a windy westerly day. She marks and lifts her ball and when it is her turn to putt, replaces the ball correctly and removes the ball marker. While preparing to putt, a strong gust of wind causes her ball to start rolling and it comes to rest at the bottom of the slope in front of the green. What is the correct ruling?
- a) The player must play the ball without penalty from its new position at the bottom of the slope
- b) The player gets a 1 stroke penalty and must replace the ball
- c) The player must replace the ball on its original spot without penalty



Rules Corner

- 4. A player's ball lies on the bank in a penalty area (formerly called a water hazard). As the ball is not in any water, she decides to play the ball as it lies. Prior to making her stroke, she removes some loose leaves near her ball, then hits the ground with her club in making a practice swing. What is the ruling?
- a) The player gets a 1 stroke penalty
- b) The player gets a 2 stroke penalty
- c) There is no penalty
- 5. In stroke play, a player plays from the teeing area on a par 3 hole. His ball strikes a tree and rebounds, coming to rest in the teeing area he had just played from. The player picks up his ball, re-tees it and plays the ball onto the green and then holes the putt. Which statement is true?
- a) The player has played 3 strokes
- b) The player has played 4 strokes
- c) The player has played 5 strokes



Rules Corner Answers

Question 1. (b) The rake is clearly a movable obstruction which may be removed if it interferes with a player's lie, stance, swing or direction of play. When a ball is resting against a movable obstruction, the player is entitled to remove the obstruction. If the ball moves, the ball must be replaced – see Rules 15.2 and 14.2.

Question 2. (b) Under the new rules the course has 5 defined areas – the general area, the teeing area of the hole being played, the putting green of the hole being played, all bunkers and all penalty areas. The general area covers the entire area of the course except the teeing area of the hole being played, all bunkers, all penalty areas and the putting green of the hole being played. See Rule 2.2

Question 3. (c) Under the new rules, if a ball at rest on a green has been marked, lifted and replaced and is then caused to move by natural forces (eg wind), the ball must be replaced on its original spot (if not known, it is estimated) without penalty. See Rule 13.1d. A ball moved by wind before it has been marked, lifted and replaced, must be played from its new spot.

Question 4. (c) Under the new rules, a player may play a ball as it lies in a penalty area under the same rules that apply to playing a ball in the general area – some of the actions now permitted under Rule 17.1b include removal of loose impediments, grounding the club in addressing the ball and making practice swings that touch the ground.

Question 5. (a) Rule 6.2 describes when Teeing Area Rules apply and what actions are permitted when playing from the teeing area. These rules apply whenever a player is required or allowed to play a ball from the teeing area and includes when a player's ball is in play after a stroke from the teeing area. Thus the player was playing his second stroke from the teeing area and was permitted to re-tee the ball anywhere in the teeing area for this stroke.
