Hope your golf game has had a good start to the year.

#### What's been happening in the shop:

On Friday the 22nd of Feb Ben and I (Alan) travelled down to Royal Wellington golf Club for a clinic taken by Michael Campbell and his golf coach from the States, Jonathan Yarwood (who has been coaching "Cambo" since before he won the US Open). The clinic was really good and we learnt some new info which was fantastic. Cambo was a really nice and down to earth guy. I wish



him all the best for his restart of his career on the Champions Tour as he has been a great ambassador for NZ Golf.

For the last few weeks we have been running our award winning Discover Golf programme. We have 37 people taking part this year and we have a really good mix of women and men. We have traditionally run discover golf in October/November but this year we are trialling it in February just to see if it is more successful this time of the year because of the weather.

#### Tip of month:

This is the time of the year where a lot of the big golfing Companies are releasing new drivers: whether it's the new Callaway Epic Flash, Cobra F9, Ping G410 or Titleist TS2. No doubt you will start seeing players on TV winning using the new drivers.

So the question we get asked a lot regarding this is "are they better than the previous model and which one is the best out of all of them". Answer: Yes they are all slightly better than their predecessor. But one is not better than the other. For example, the Callaway is no better than the Titleist or vice versa. What is most important is to find out which is best for you. There will be one of these drivers that is better than the rest for you, but you won't know that unless you go through a fitting process where you get the chance to try all the drivers together and compare. They all have some really cool features and new technology in them. So just pop in to the shop and book a fitting time with one of our experts and find out how far you can hit them!

Please note, as Ian Anderson highlighted in the December Newsletter, the Manawatu Golf Club Committee has chosen NOT to adopt the optional Local Rule that allows players to drop a ball with a 2-stroke penalty for a lost or out of bounds ball. It is important to check the local rules when visiting golf clubs to check what their Local rules are. At the 1st weekend of Handicap pennants one local club turned up at Marton assuming this rule was in place. Thankfully all was sorted before any embarrassing situations eventuated.

The first round of pennants produced mixed results for our interclub teams. The A's playing at Palmerston North thoroughly bet Taihape 8.5 to 0.5, the B's playing at Buckley got a good win over Rangitikei 5 to 3. Unfortunately, the Handicap pennants team followed last years poor start with 2 losses going down 3-6 against Castlecliff then 2-7 to Foxton. The Presidents team started with a good win 8.5 to 3.5 over Levin at home but then lost away to Linton 3 to 9. The women's teams have had a slow start, but Lisa and Rebecca did have a first up win over Wanganui in the Championship pennants.

I hope everyone has been embracing the new Golf rules. It has definitely sped up golf rounds, I have yet to play a round over 4 hours this year. That said, I have recently had to deal with an issue of slow play on Saturdays. With the new rules there is really no excuse now for slow play. I for one like the option to leave the flag in, perhaps only taking it out for big breaking putts or where the pole's shadow is confusing my read.

Please note that the temporary fences on the 8th and 11/12th are immovable obstructions. You may not cross these fences to get your ball. If you can identify your ball and it is still in bounds you may take free relief (see Rule 16). However, if it is not known or virtually certain that the ball came to rest in or on an abnormal course condition i.e. between the out-of-bounds and the temporary fences and the ball is lost, the player must take stroke-and-distance relief under Rule 18.2. Make sure you have the new rules book in your bag or the App on your phone.

Remember first and foremost Golf is about fun!

#### **Rules Corner**

As we enter the third month of play under the new Rules of Golf, it is timely to remind members that the basic tenets under which we play this great game remain unchanged. The following advice neatly describes how we should all approach playing golf - "play the ball as it lies, play the course as you find it and if you cannot do either, do what is fair. But to do what is fair you need to know the Rules of Golf".

While it is easy for us to be more concerned about what to do when confronted by very unusual (and uncommon) situations during play, I firmly believe that members should concentrate their efforts towards understanding the Rules as they apply to everyday situations that we encounter in almost every round we play. One of my favourite quotes that directly applies to understanding and applying the Rules of Golf is "common things occur commonly". During each round we are regularly faced with situations that require some decision and application of one of the Rules of Golf. It is the important to know and apply the appropriate rule when required to react to these common situations.

Here are some examples of the common situations we encounter:

- 1. Identifying your ball many believe it is permissible to just roll their ball on the ground to see their identification mark and do so without first marking the position of the ball. Under Rule 9.4b this action incurs a 1 stroke penalty.
- 2. Relief from an immovable obstruction it is important to know what the immovable obstructions on our course are ( eg all formed paths and roads, hole signs and surrounding structures, all sprinkler heads, tee markers other than the ones on the hole being played, clearly planted trees under 2 club lengths high, tree stakes there are others see the definition of immovable obstructions). Know how to proceed when taking relief from an immovable obstruction.
- 3. Relief from an abnormal course condition (GUR, temporary water)
- 4. Relief for an embedded ball see the new rule 16.3 which now allows relief in the general area and replaces a previous Local Rule
- 5. Know the three options available for a ball declared unplayable
- 6. Know when you can ( and should!) play a provisional ball
- 7. The procedure if your ball is lost when is it lost?, how long can you search for it?
- 8. When your ball is OB what defines the OB, what is the correct procedure?
- 9. When you can clean a lifted ball know the times that you cannot clean your ball

It is also timely for members to re-read and fully understand the central principles of the game well described in Rule 1. This Rule clearly defines standards of player conduct and the expectation that all players will play in the spirit of the game by:

 Acting with integrity – following the rules, applying all penalties and being honest in all aspects of play

- Showing consideration to others playing at a prompt pace, looking out for the safety
  of others, and not distracting the play of another player (especially by moving, talking or
  standing directly behind or beyond another players line)
- Taking good care of the course replacing divots, repairing ball pitch mark, raking bunkers and not causing unnecessary damage to the course.

While there is no penalty under the Rules for failing to act in this way, under the new Rules, the Committee may set its own standards of player conduct in a Code of Conduct as a Local Rule. Any such code could include penalties for breach of its standards (any of, one stroke penalty, general penalty, or in the case of repeated breaches or serious misconduct, disqualification).

#### **COURSE REPORT**

February has come and gone, dews are already here in the morning and the nights becoming colder. The course is looking great for this time of the year, I hope that members and the visitors are enjoying the conditions.

Greens have been Fertilized, Verti-cut and Top-dressed. Greens are running true and smooth. Stimp meter is at 9.5 to 10 feet. Greens with be solid tined on 11th March, this is to allow air in the profile as well as decompaction. Tees and Surrounds have great cover. Tees have been solid fed, surrounds foliar. Wetting agent was applied last month to help hold any moisture needed. Looking to Core and Dethatch the Tees on the 11th of March.

Fairways are also in good condition. Few have patches where the Poa (grass Species) has died or the irrigation does not quite reach. Dethatching the Fairways on the 11th of March also. Main reason that we try and do majority of the renovation work as we can at the same time, is to not disrupt golfers too much.

A couple of things, please continue to repair pitch marks and replace divots, please take care where you a driving your golf carts, and my last note Is, THE FESCUE BANK FROM 14TH FAIRWAY/GREEN TO THE 15<sup>th</sup> BLUE TEE IS NOT A PATH!!!!.. My team and I are seeing golfers walk up the bank, not only is it a health and safety risk if this becomes wet, it destroys the grass.

Trees on the right of the 14th Fairway short of the green were removed due to shade issues creating a wet area (4 trees in total)

I hope that all golfers and visitors enjoy their golfing month  $\odot$  I look forward to entering in the MacLennan with Sam again this year.


