Golfing Tip:

How to play out of Firm sand or when there is very little sand in the bunkers? This is a Question we are often asked in the shop.

Most things stay the same as if you were playing out of a nice fluffy lie in the bunker except one major thing how your club reacts with the sand. When we are in fluffy sand we want to open up the club face and let the bounce (on the sole of the club) help the club not to dig into the sand. It is exactly opposite when you're in really hard/firm sand we want the club to dig in, so the club doesn't bounce and thin the ball over the green or straight into the lip. So the next time you are in a bunker and there is very little sand in it or it is firm from rain try not opening the club face. Keep it square and let the leading edge of the club face dig into the sand.

The Greenkeepers wish all members and visitors well in the coming month of May in their golfing game, whether it be a match or a casual hit out. Enjoy your time.


NOTE:

RULES CORNER

This month we will pose the last set of six questions from the R&A Rules quiz posted in January. I am sure these questions will test your knowledge of the Rules and provide a timely opportunity for you to revise several of the applicable Rules. Your feedback is always welcome as are any interesting Rules situations you may have encountered here at the MGC or elsewhere.

- 1. Ross chips from off the green and his ball comes to rest against the flagstick, but is not fully below the level of the lip of the hole. He asks his caddie to remove the flagstick but in doing so the ball rolls several inches away from the hole. What is the ruling?
- A. Ross must replace the ball against the flagstick without penalty and remove the flagstick himself.
- B. The ball must be placed on the lip of the hole without penalty.
- C. The ball must be played from where it now lies a few inches from the hole, without penalty.
- **2.** Rod's ball is at rest on a grass bank within the margins of a water hazard, however, it is lying very close to the edge of a bridge meaning that he will clearly have interference from the bridge with the area of his intended swing. Which of the following statements is true?
- A. Rod may take free relief from the bridge which may result in him dropping the ball outside the water hazard.
- B. Rod may take free relief from the bridge, but the ball must be dropped within the margins of the water hazard.
- C. The only relief Rod can take is from the water hazard, under penalty of one stroke.
- 3. In stroke play, Nikki putts from just off the green. After she makes contact with the ball, it hits a pitch mark on her line causing it to jump up into the air and connect with her putter for a second time when she follows through. What is the ruling?
- A. Nikki incurs a one-stroke penalty and must replay the stroke.
- B. Nikki incurs a one-stroke penalty and must play the ball as it lies.
- C. Nikki incurs a two-stroke penalty and must play the ball as it lies.
- **4.** In match play, Nikki plays her 2nd shot towards the green. As she was playing directly into the sun, neither she, nor her opponent, Ross, saw where the ball finished. Believing the ball may have gone through the back of the green, the players search for the ball in that area. However, after failing to find it within 5 minutes, Nikki concedes the hole. Ross then decides to putt out for his 3, only to find Nikki's ball in the hole. What is the ruling?
- A. Nikki's concession stands and Ross wins the hole.
- B. Nikki wins the hole, having holed out in two strokes.
- C. The hole is halved.
- 5. In a stroke play competition, Kevin tees off in the morning and posts a good score. In the afternoon, Kevin caddies for Ross in the same competition on the same course. What is the ruling?
- A. Kevin's score stands as played, but Ross is disqualified as his caddie is considered to have practiced on the competition course.
- B. Both Kevin and Ross are disqualified for a serious breach of etiquette.
- C. There is no penalty to either player.

RULES CORNER Cont..

6. In stroke play, Nikki hits her drive over an area of dense trees towards another hole. After searching for 3 minutes, she finds a ball that she believes to be her original ball in the rough and plays it back towards the correct fairway. She eventually holes out for a bogey 5, however, when removing the ball from the hole, she realises that it is not her original ball. Realising that she must have played a wrong ball for her second shot, Nikki returns to the teeing ground, and proceeds to take 4 strokes to hole out with her second ball. What is Nikki's score for the hole?

A. 6



Question 1. B See Rule 17-4. The "normal" action of a player whose ball is resting against the flagstick, but not holed, is to carefully remove the flagstick in a way to ensure the ball falls into the hole which means the player has holed out with his/her last stroke. However, if the ball is moved by the action of removing the flagstick, (and clearly not holed), the ball must be placed on the lip of the hole without penalty.

Question 2. C Note 1 to Rule24-2 clearly states "If a ball is in a water hazard, the player may not take relief from interference by an immovable obstruction. The player must play the ball as it lies or proceed under Rule 26-1" (Relief from a ball in a water hazard).

Question 3. B If a player, in making a stroke at the ball, "double-hits" the ball, the player must count the stroke and add 1 penalty stroke and play the ball as it lies – see Rule 14-4.

Question 4. B Read Rule 2-4 carefully. A player may not concede a hole after conclusion of the hole. As Nikki had in fact holed out in 2 strokes and her opponent Ross could not beat this score, the hole was concluded. Although Nikki had conceded the hole to Ross (in the belief that her ball was lost), Nikki was completely within her rights to claim the hole when her ball had been found in the hole – provided she did so before Ross played from the next teeing ground. The statement in Rule 2-4 "that a concession may not be declined or withdrawn" is not applicable in this case because the concession was made after the conclusion of the hole.

Question 5. C See Rules 6-4 and 7-1b. There is no prohibition on a player in the same competition acting as caddie for another player, even if the "caddie" has played on the course earlier that day. Thus Ross could have Kevin act as caddie for him in the afternoon round and there is no problem regarding the caddie (Kevin) having "practised" on the course - as a competitor (Ross) is only responsible for the actions of his caddie during a stipulated round.

Question 6. C

- 1 X original drive
- 2 X under Rule 15-3b (playing a wrong ball)
- 1 X under Rule 27-1 (stroke and distance penalty for lost ball)
- 4 X strokes with second ball







